**Workload per semester**

Immigration regulations require you to be enrolled in a full-time program of study while participating in the UW-Madison exchange program. Depending on the number of credits assigned to the classes you choose, that means that you must register for at least three or four classes totaling: at least 8 credits if you are graduate student at your home institution, or: at least 12 credits if you are an undergraduate at your home institution.

## **Accommodations**

### **Is on-campus accommodation available to exchange students?**

Since most students at the University of Wisconsin-Madison are not from the Madison area, housing near campus is usually in ample supply. Most exchange students live in apartments and dorms. If you would like to stay in university housing, contact International Engineering Studies and Programs as soon as possible, the fall/year deadline is March 15. Spring placements in university housing will depend on availability and will vary from year to year. Most on-campus residence halls are typically inhabited by first and second year students. Be sure to review descriptions of individual residence halls to determine if there is one that would be a good match for you.

## **Arrival/Orientation**

### **When should I arrive?**

Arrive in time to participate in Welcome Week and International Student Orientation activities, which take place the week before classes begin. A special orientation session for exchange students will take place during the orientation week. A complete schedule of the week's events

will be available when you arrive on campus. International students cannot enter the United States any more than 30 days before the start of the semester.

### **Is airport reception available?**

If you are flying to Madison, you will arrive at the Dane County Regional Airport, located about 7 miles from campus. Taxi service from the airport to campus is approximately \$20 one-way. If there are no taxis waiting at the airport, you can call Union Cab (242-2000), Badger Cab (256-5566), Madison Taxi (255-TAXI) or others. We recommend simply writing down your address on a piece of paper and handing it to the cab driver at the airport. That way you can avoid any miscommunication! You can also ask Madison Friends of International Students (MFIS) <http://www.iss.wisc.edu/mfis/> to pick you up at the airport.

If you are flying into Chicago's O'Hare Airport, you can take the Van Galder bus to Madison. Van Galder buses depart daily, every 1-1½ hours, between 6:30 AM and 10:30 PM. The fare is approximately \$29 one-way and you can buy your ticket from the bus driver or online. The bus journey from Chicago to Madison takes three hours, as the Van Galder stops in several smaller towns before it arrives in Madison. Once in Madison, the bus will make two stops. You'll want to depart at the second Madison stop — the Memorial Union. After you arrive at the Memorial Union, you can either take a taxi or walk to your place of accommodation. ### **Is there any bank on campus?**

Most local banks will require a Social Security Number. If you do not have one, the University of Wisconsin Credit Union ([uwcu.org](http://uwcu.org)) will allow you to set up an account with your passport. UWCU has free debit withdrawals and checking, so it is a good choice for banking.

**City Info**

Located in Madison, the campus spreads out along Lake Mendota, encompassing wooded hills, friendly shores and lively city streets.

Madison—the state’s capital city with a population of 210,000—offers the perfect combination of natural beauty, stimulating cultural offerings, outdoor recreation, distinctive restaurants, unique shops and vibrant nightlife.

The university’s location in south central Wisconsin makes for convenient access to Milwaukee (80 miles), Chicago (150 miles) and Minneapolis (270 miles). Daily buses serve all three cities.

Madison is located in a temperate climate zone and has four distinct seasons—spring, summer, fall and winter. During the warmest months of June, July and August, high temperatures average 80-90 degrees Fahrenheit (27+ Celsius). Winters are cold with moderate snowfall. In the middle of winter, high temperatures average 25 degrees Fahrenheit (-4 Celsius) though temperatures can fall below 0 degrees Fahrenheit (-18 Celsius) Average annual snowfall is 35 inches (89 cm).
